The next twelve months will see many new improvements and ideas for the villages.

Playgrounds

Workinginpartnership,ourlocalCountyCouncillors, Simon Wilson and Emma Waldock have agreed with theArea Action Partnership (AAP) team for Chester-le-Street for newadditions to the Kimblesworth and Nettlesworth playgrounds. ThankyoutobothSimonandEmma.





The parish council has campaigned for a refresh to both parks for time and have also contributed some financially to the new equipment (pictured). Α new climber and slide will be added at Nettlesworth and a new see-saw style at Kimblesworth, both the swing in coming months. The Parish Council looking to are improve seating and paths at the parks, if required.

Public Right of Way, Plawsworth

After three years of back and forth, site visits and persuasion, Durham County Council (DCC) have agreed to the resurfacing of the small path connecting the A167 bus stop to Wheatleywell Lane at Plawsworth.

The County Council will fund the new path and a replacement bottom gate, whilst the Parish Council are considering options to replace the open top gate and signage.

We are pleased DCC have indicated maintenance and refurbishment will be complete this calendar year.



Ugly Lane, Nettlesworth

Funding has been provided via our County Councillors to create a small car park to alleviate issues at the football field on a weekend, to assist with drop off and pick up times at the primary school too. The plans are agreed but we are awaiting approval from DCC's Assets Team who hold the land in trust for KPPC and this is taking a little time.

New memorial bench, Cedar Avenue

Residents may have noticed the newly paved area off the B6312, at the junction to Cedar Avenue which appeared in March.

A carved bench was due to be placed here but due to circumstances outside of our control, a metal bench referencing the area's mining past will be placed here instead.

Work will be complete soon.

Hopefully it will be worth the wait.

Nettlesworth spring and trough

A monument to the history of the spring and trough that has sat at Broadmires across at least three centuries is now complete.



The former trough had fallen into disrepair since the water source was switched off many years ago.

A stepped area has

been created, with paving and natural stone bricks and lime mortar. The surrounding area has been reseeded, to bring the grass back up to the monument. It was not required, nor practical, to bring running water back to the trough. The Council are now considering options for a phase two, which may include the



addition of an ornamental tap, a plaque or information panel, and potentially seating. Initial

feedback has been good— we hope our residents approve. The monument is dedicated to the community, remembering family and friends that drank there, and the horses that



stopped for refreshment on their travels.

Summer Fun Day The local family fun day for the villages took place on Sunday 4th June, at Nettlesworth Community Centre, with a significant financial contribution made by the Parish Council to ensure fairground rides were available for free to our villages' children. Thank you to Sacriston Youth Project for organising the event, to the Community Association for hosting it at the centre and providing volunteers, and to County Durham Community Foundation for co-funding.

"What a wonderful day. Thank you to all involved. Well done!"


"Today has made my day. I have had lots of people come to my stall and have talked to so many people."

What do residents want?

The Council have had many suggestions and requests over the last few years that have not yet progressed due to various reasons, such as funding, land permissions, resident support or other priorities that have been pushed to the forefront. Below are some recent ideas from residents:

- An outdoor war memorial to complement the existing indoor memorial at Nettlesworth Community Centre—this outdoor memorial could perhaps be placed at Kimblesworth.
- **Tree planting** to complement the trees already planted adjacent to Darley Court, Plawsworth, along the A167.
- Improvements to the streets in Sacriston that fall within our parish boundary— seating at the top of Cross Lane is a recent suggestion.
- The Council received approval during COVID for funding to erect **a fence around the football pitch** This would still be open to the public but it is hoped the perimeter around the marked pitch itself would deter people walking across the pitch and help maintain its condition.
- A second defibrillator—Although Nettlesworth Community Centre has a defibrillator (funded by KPPC), it has been suggested Kimblesworth Cricket Club would benefit from their own. Do you agree?

Leyland Clock

We have been contacted by a researcher who is investigating a clock that stood at the side of the A1 (now A167) road at Plawsworth. It had been relocated from its original site at Healam Bridge, in Yorkshire, when the A1 was improved in 1955. In later years, it was dismantled and sent back to Leyland Motors. It was subsequently overhauled, then packed and shipped to the main Leyland agents in Sydney, Leyland Clocks were located at Australia. prominent positions on major UK roads in the 1930s by Leyland Motors Limited.

The property will have a board room, and other rooms which will be used for delivering projects such as 'Type 1', which is a peer support group for children and families with Type 1 Diabetes, and a Youth Council, assisting those who are looked after to help them moving forward.
